New food growing site at Crown Dale Medical Centre

Lambeth GP Food Co-op will launch a new food growing site at Crown Dale Medical Centre as our part of our contribution to NHS Sustainability Day on 22nd March.

Dr Nico Scaravilli, GP Partner at Crown Dale Medical Centre gives her thoughts on the latest partnership with Lambeth GP Food Co-op:

"I was keen to get involved in this project to address the imbalance between illness and wellbeing that creeps in when there are so many pressures on the health system.

I am hoping the garden will become a focus for patients who are perhaps living with a long term health condition or who are isolated. Patients can come along for a few hours a week outdoors and learn to grow vegetables whilst enjoying a cup of tea with neighbours and staff from the practice. No gardening skills required.

The benefits of spending time in the garden and connecting with others in the community are well established and I hope other doctors in the practice are as enthusiastic as me at directing patients to the project rather than reaching out for the prescription pad.

At a time when mental illness is on the increase and people hardly know their neighbours; it is even more pressing than ever to try and re- establish some connections and support in the local community and I hope Crown Dale Medical Centre's gardening project will go some way in doing this. The garden will be a place for patients to come and learn about staying healthy rather than coming to the surgery only when they are ill.

As a GP these days, it is typical not to leave your consulting room for 10 -11 hours as we plough through paperwork and try and deal with the increasing demands on our time. The planters will create an opportunity for staff to pop out, do some weeding, have a chat to our patients and will be a welcome break from our hectic days.

We have just had 3 planters delivered into our garden at the back of the surgery. The Good Gym Team, a group of runners who combine running with helping the community, came to transfer soil into the planters.

Now all we need are some seeds, patients and practice staff to help grow vegetables!"

A community food growing garden on Brixton Hill

Katakata is an award winning vegan and vegetarian restaurant in the heart of Brixton Hill. In February a discussion took place between Katakata and Lambeth GP Food Co-op to explore the possibility of a partnership arrangement which would include the use of the large restaurant garden for growing vegetables.

At the moment the garden is unused and with the help of Lambeth GP Food Co-op and its partners it could be transformed into a community food growing garden by April. Katakata's aim 'is to promote healthy living and lifestyle choices through food', and will offer patients from Brixton Hill surgery opportunities to learn how to grow vegetables and in time to learn how to prepare nutritious and delicious vegetarian meals at low cost.

Our vision is to bring into productive use local gardens and public land for food growing. We look forward to developing a unique partnership between a local restaurant and a GP surgery which will benefit local people by improving their diet and personal wellbeing.

We will screen 'A Pool of Information', a documentary that traces the stories of those who were part of the Pioneer Health Centre, followed by a short film about the work of the Lambeth GP Food Co-op.



There will be opportunity for a Q&A with the Director, Jini Rawlings, and a wider discussion among those present about how to strengthen relationships between health and the community of Lambeth and Southwark, so that together we can make our healthcare services more sustainable for the future.

We hope that this event will be of interest to local residents, clinicians, members of local community gardens and arts groups, public health professionals, and our local councillors.

"One of the earliest examples of public health interventions in a disadvantaged community. The Pioneer Health Centre, better known as the Peckham Experiment, was opened in Peckham, South East London, in 1935. Run as a family centre, it was an experiment to discover and promote the growth of positive health.

75 years later it still provides an important model for a healthy society, where the quality of health and vitality is important." Concord Media
